Westgate Street- Mosaics

- Bull Lane
 - Depicts a bull
 - The lane takes its name from the Bull Inn which stood opposite Cross Keys Lane from about 1700. Prior to this it was called Gore Lane (there were a number of slaughter houses in the vicinity).
- Three Cocks Lane
 - Depicts three cocks
 - The name derives from the name of an 18th century Inn which stood on the western side of the lane near the junction with St Mary's Square. Also called Abbey Lane (for the Cathedral access) and Portcullis Lane (for another nearby Inn).
- Maverdine Lane/ 26 Westgate Street
 - Depicts judges wig
 - 26 Westgate Street in the early 19th century was used as lodgings for assize judges.
- Mercers Entry
 - o Depicts, needle and thread, waistcoat
 - Located opposite what was the drapery business of James Wood, he also ran the Gloucester Old Bank from these premises.
- St Johns Lane
 - Depicts a fish and herbs
 - An open space opposite St Johns Lane, called the Knapp, was the site of a herb and fish market selling locally caught Salmon and Lamprey which the appropriate culinary flavourings
- College Court
 - Depicts a crown and tools
 - A mediaeval lane which leads to the Cathedral, the crown could relate to the royal connections at the Cathedral (Edward II is buried there and Henry III was crowned there) while the tools probably relate to the stonework and craftsmanship used to build the Cathedral.
